## A Word from our Interim Moderator – Attie van Wyk

#### Dear Logie Kirk Friends,

Advent and Christmas are upon us. The past year you have faced some big challenges regarding the future of Logie Kirk and the way forward. I would like to thank you for your positive attitude, and every volunteer, especially the Kirk Session, Office Bearers, and Clerks who've contributed towards the great success of a loving and caring ministry at Logie during the time of vacancy. You surely know what it means to be Church.

The Advent and Christmas seasons bring with them the joy of festivities and cherished moments spent with family and loved ones. Yet, for others, it can be a difficult time — a season of longing for those who are far away or no longer with us.

In South Africa, as in many countries, it is a longstanding tradition during Advent and Christmas to visit care homes, orphanages, and similar institutions to share the joy of the season. This tradition reminded me of a touching story about a missionary couple who visited an orphanage.

Before distributing gifts, the missionary's wife gathered the children to tell them the Christmas story. She shared how Joseph and Mary arrived in Bethlehem, only to find there was



no place for them to stay,

leading them to take shelter in a stable. There. Jesus was born placed in and manger. The children sat spellbound; their eves fixed on her as they heard this story most of them for the very first time. After the the story. missionaries handed pieces out cardboard and taught the children how to

make their own mangers.

Once the mangers were ready, the children collected bits of grass to place inside. Strips of cloth were distributed as blankets and felt was provided to craft a figure representing the Baby Jesus.

As the children eagerly worked on their creations, the missionary's wife walked among them to admire their efforts. Everything looked wonderful until she reached the table where a little boy named Mike, about five years old, was

sitting. To her surprise, she noticed that his manger held not one baby, but two.

Thinking Mike might have misunderstood the story, she gently asked him to explain it as he understood it. Mike retold the story beautifully, all the way to the moment when Joseph and Mary laid Baby Jesus in the manger. Then, with quiet confidence, he added his own special version:

"And I was there that night when Jesus was born. Jesus looked at me and asked, 'Mike, do you have a place to stay?' And I said to Him, 'No, Jesus, I don't have a mom or a dad, and I don't have a house to stay in. I'm an orphan, with nowhere to belong.'

Then Jesus said to me, 'You can come and stay with Me.' So, I thought for a moment and said, 'But Jesus, I don't have a gift to give You, like the wise men did.' Then I asked Him, 'Would it be okay if I lay in the manger with You and kept You warm? That could be my gift.'

Jesus looked at me and said, 'If you keep Me warm, that will be the greatest gift ever.' So, I climbed into the manger with Him, and Jesus said, 'Mike, you can stay with Me forever and ever. We'll be fine!'"

With tears in his eyes, Mike looked up at the missionary's wife and said, "Now I have Someone I belong to. Someone who will

never push me away because I'm an orphan. Someone I can always stay with."

This story moved me deeply. It reminds us of the true meaning of Advent and Christmas. This season is about Emmanuel—God with us. Jesus invites us just as we are, accepts us as we are, and loves us as we are. For those who feel cast aside, lonely, unloved, or without a sense of belonging, His message is clear: He will always make room for us. He will never leave or forsake us.

During Advent, we celebrate the birth of the Christ Child—God's greatest gift to us—and we also look forward to His promised return, when He will unite us with the family of believers. As Jesus says in John 14:18: "I will not leave you as orphans; I will come to you."

May the love and peace of Christ fill your hearts this Advent and Christmas season.

#### **Becoming a Stirling Street Pastor**

When we moved to Stirling from Nottingham in 2018, I knew I wanted to continue volunteering. I spent a few years volunteering with Home Start Stirling and Listenwell Scotland. While rewarding, it was very focussed on using my professional knowledge and I realised last year that I needed to do something totally different.

I was aware of Street Pastors from our time living in Nottingham and when I saw a post on Facebook for new volunteers, I decided to go for it and find out more. My journey started with doing an observer patrol this time last year (November 2023) - with the pleasant outcome that I managed to stay awake until 3.30am!

Street Pastors are volunteers from across the Christian faith community who aim to provide practical help on the night-time streets by caring, listening, and helping. In Stirling, this means we patrol the town centre on Fridays and Saturdays from 10pm until 3am (or, if you're lucky and The Fubar has a late licence, until 4am) and the University Campus on Fridays over the lunchtime period.

We offer practical help - we carry bottles of water, flip flops, hats, and gloves now it is getting colder, space blankets, brush and shovel to clear away broken glass and, of course, lollipops. We meet and chat with people out in the pubs and

clubs as well as those who may find themselves sleeping on the streets. We provide a listening ear for those who want to chat or in need of support.

We come from all walks of life and churches across Stirling and surrounding areas and range in age from 20s to 80s - a Glasgow volunteer recently retired at the age of 92 years!

We are always looking to increase our volunteer numbers so if you are curious, please do let me know, I'm happy to chat anytime. For me it is proving to be a very rewarding way to give some time back to our community.

20 stalls were involved selling Christmas decorations, other crafts involving wood, and fantastic sewn and knitted goods. The Tombola Stall which was donated by the congregation was huge, so thank you to all at Logie who donated. Wallace's Ochil House staff and pupils brought their crafts along as did pupils from Cornton Primary who were so polite, bright, and cheery it was great having them in the hall.

In the end we raised £1375 for Babes in the Wood, a tremendous amount. Some stall holders donated their entire sales and some donated unsold stock to Ochil House for an upcoming event. One stall holder donated her unsold knitted items to Babes in the Wood.

Two unexpected bonuses are that staff from Ochil house are bringing some of their pupils along to the Coffee Morning, they have been sadly missed since Covid.

Staff at Babes in the Wood were so impressed by Sharon's poster for the event and how many were dotted around the Stirling area that they are delighted that our very talented Sharon is going to give them some help.


